Course Description: The second semester of the Humanities Core might be called "Studies of The Way." The readings all raise the question of finding a proper pathway through life: how does one recognize the proper path, what discipline, knowledge, skills are required to follow such a path—and where does it lead?

Many of the questions raised in the first semester--questions about the gods, about nature and civilization, justice and <u>eros</u>, <u>logos</u> and art--remain important. But the pathway through life--religious or ethical--becomes the focus of the course.

Grading: Final grades will be determined by the student's seminar instructor and will follow the University curve (A=4.0, A-=3.7, etc.). The grade will be based on a combination of written work, examinations, and participation valued in the following proportions:
