As you begin your research...

Whether you are researching a particular woman in African history or a particular topic, take a moment to familiarize yourself with the African countries you are looking at.

**Resources may exist in the language of the colonial government and may dictate how names are written:

For example, "Njinga" could be written as "Nzingha" or "Nzinga".

- **Arm yourself with as much information as possible and all possible variations of a name as you conduct your research. It is critical in the number of results you retrieve when using the library catalog, electronic databases, and the internet.
- **Identify authors who are specialists in the field, search for other works they have written.
- **Whom do those authors cite? **Check the bibliog- raphies of books** on your topic in order to find additional resources.
- **If the topic is extremely specific, for example, you want to find rites & traditions performed by the Masai when a child is born, try looking at a more general book such as an ethnography of the people. Search chapter headings and indexes for the information you need.

Finding Resources in the BU Catalog...

The Library has a new & catalog that searches across our print and digital collections.

Begin with a **keyword** search and try various combinations. You can narrow your results using the menu on the left.

How you search can determine the number of results:

For example:

Broader search: South Africa (yields 114,613 results!)

Winnie Mandela (yields 72 results)

Narrower search: Winnie Mandela AND apartheid (40 results)

Saving your sources: Sign in using your BU Log-in. You can save favorite articles to your e-shelf, so that you can return later and view them directly. You can also save old searches.

There's also an **Advanced Search** and **Specialized Search**, to help you with more specific searches.

These are just some of the 311 databases available via the library website:

Africa-Wide Information [Log-in required]

17 databases from 3 continents providing access to multidisciplinary information on Africa., resource contains over 662,800 indexed references, many with abstracts. Topics include politics, history, economics, business, mining, development, social issues, anthropology, literature, language, law, music

Anthropological Literature [Log-in required]

Describes articles and essays on anthropology and archaeology, including art history, demography, economics, psychology, and religious studies. Updated quarterly, Anthropological Literature indexes articles two or more pages long in works published in English and other European languages from the late 19th century to the present.

JSTOR [Log-in required]

A full-text database of back issues of scholarly journals, including topics such as: African studies, anthropology, ecology, economics, education, finance, history, literature, philosophy, political science, population studies, sociology, and statistics.

<u>Project Muse</u> [Log-in required] Consists of full-text articles from scholarly journals in the humanities and social science fields. MUSE also provides online access, full-text, to content from approximately 100 non-profit publishers.

Women's Studies International [Log-in required]

A database (citations or citations/abstracts) of over 548,000 records including resources such as: Women Studies Abstracts (1972-), Women's Studies Bibliography Database, Women's Studies Database (1972-), MEDLINE Subset on Women (1964-) Women of Color and Southern Women: A Bibliography of Social Science Research (1975-1995), Women's Health and Development: An Annotated Bibliography (1995) and four files from Women's Studies Librarian.

<u>Contemporary Women's Issues</u> [Log-in required]

A full-text database, international in scope, covering such subjects as violence and sexual exploitation, human rights, development, health, family life and the arts. Sources include journals, research reports, newsletters, alternative press literature and fact sheets. Coverage is from 1992 to date.
