Dear Friends,

Welcome to Boston Playwrights' Theatre and to the first production of our 2022-2023 season: *Eat Your Young* by J.C. Pankratz, directed by Shamus. This is also my first production as BPT's Artistic Director, carrying forward a season that was put in motion by the legendary Kate Snodgrass, who retired this year after an extraordinary 35 years at the helm!

I am delighted to be here and to be producing five brand-new plays by MFA playwrights. This group of writers—whose entire graduate education has taken place during a global pandemic—offer us critical reflections on the big questions of this moment: "How do we live when we feel like the world is ending?" and "If our very survival depends on resisting old ideas and seeding new ones, what stories must we tell—and how?"

I can't think of a better way to begin than with J.C.'s magical, funny, chaotic play. *Eat Your Young* muses on the capricious power of the natural world and posits a thin line between decimation and transformation. There are many leaps of imagination in the play, but sadly the situation of the young campers is not one of them; unregulated "wilderness therapy" programs have been cited for widespread neglect and abuse of their teen participants. You can find more information in our production resources at **BostonPlaywrights.org > Eat Your Young.** Still, I'm betting that this tough, charming, and silly group of campers will steal your heart, as they have mine—reminding us that even in the darkest and weirdest of times, the key is to stick together.

To this end, each production entered is eligible for a response by a regional KCACTF representative, and selected students and faculty are invited to participate in KCACTF programs involving scholarships, internships, grants and awards for actors, directors, dramaturgs, playwrights, designers, stage managers and critics at both the regional and national levels.

Productions entered on the Participating level are eligible for invitation to the KCACTF regional festival and may also be considered for national awards recognizing outstanding achievement in production, design, direction and performance.

Last year more than 1,500 productions were entered in the KCACTF involving more than 200,000 students nationwide. By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward, and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.

Boston **PLAYWRIGHTS'** Theatre

Boston Playwrights' Theatre is an award-winning professional theatre at Boston University dedicated to new works. Founded in 1981 by Nobel Laureate Derek Walcott, the heart of BPT's mission is the production of new plays by students and alumni of BU's MFA Playwriting Program—a collaboration with BU's renowned School of Theatre. The program's award-winning alumni have been produced in regional and New York houses, as well as in London's West End. BPT's productions have been honored with numerous regional and Boston awards, including awards from the Independent Reviewers of New England (IRNE) and Boston Critics' Association (Elliot Norton Awards).

From class workshops to our Season of New Plays, BPT employs the best of New England's professional actors, directors, and designers to bring each playwright's vision to its first audiences.

Each spring we produce New Noises: Massachusetts Young Playwrights' Project. Area high schools work with professional playwrights, directors, and actors to see student works on stage for the first time.

Fifty local theatre companies join us annually for the Boston Theater Marathon, a showcase of new ten-minute plays by New England playwrights chosen each year from hundreds of entrants. Each play is produced by a different New England theatre company in a single ten-hour event with all proceeds going to charity.

When we are not producing plays, we continue our mission through the New Play Odyssey Program, which makes theatre space available to other New England theatre companies and playwrights for readings and festivals of new plays.
