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Sharing BWHS Research Results

- Experiences of racism are linked to increased risk of <u>heart disease</u> and <u>stroke</u> in Black women
- Long-term use of chemical hair relaxers is associated with increased risk of <u>uterine</u> <u>cancer</u> in Black women

New grant award

Investigators from the BWHS received a new grant from the National Institutes of Health to study the effectiveness of lung cancer screening in Black women who have ever smoked. Under current screening guidelines, many current or former smokers may not meet eligibility criteria for low-dose CT scan (LDCT) screening. As part of this new grant, we will recruit BWHS participants with a history of smoking to evaluate the use of LDCT to reduce lung cancer mortality in Black women.
