

Notes on PowerPoint slides for „Macroeconomics in Context: A European perspective“ by Dullien/Goodwin/Harris/Nelson/Roach/Torras

On the companion website of *Macroeconomics in Context: A European Perspective*, you can download PowerPoint lecture slides for each of the chapters of the textbook. These slides have been prepared by Petra Dünhaupt und Sebastian Dullien.

In principle, these slides can be directly applied for teaching. However, we would caution you not to do so without reviewing the slides first. We are well aware that teaching styles differ significantly between lecturers and, therefore, it is unlikely that a set of slides works well for all lecturers. In preparing the slides, by and large, we have taken the approach to rather err on the side of including too many than too few slides. At the same time, we have generally not included the material of the textbook presented in the boxes. We think it is a good idea to go through the slides and see whether this level of detail is appropriate for your teaching style, and either delete slides or add other slides.

We have also experimented a bit with graphical elements. The slides to some chapters (e.g. chapter 6) contain more graphical elements than the slides to other chapters.

The slide set is still a work-in-progress. While we have used the slides in our own lectures and have made some corrections afterwards, they are far from perfect. Thus, it would be great to receive some feedback in how far the slide sets work for you. Please e-mail us to sebastian.dullien@htw.berlin.de .
