In-Class Activity: Option 2
Online Implementation

Note for instructors: Another approach to this activity is to create a shared Google doc in advance and share the link with students in class, so that they can add their sentences to the class doc. It is recommended that the teacher create three sections in the doc, each corresponding to the different quotation strategy being practiced.

Below is a short passage taken from <u>page 147</u> of Stephen Pax Leonard's essay "Death by Monoculture." Read the passage, and then follow the directions below.

"When languages die, we do not just lose words, but we lose different ways of conceptually framing things."

Now, create sentences in which you integrate some or all of the quotation above using each of the three methods detailed in the video and signaled below. You are welcome to quote portions of the passage or the entire thing. Make sure to include a proper parenthetical citation at the end of each of your sentences to credit the source.

Create a sentence in which you integrate the quotation using...

- 1. an independent clause and a colon (:)
- an introductory phrase or dependent clause and a comma (,)
- 3. a grammatically correct sentence requiring no punctuation

Write your ideas down in any format that is best for you, such as a Google doc. Be ready to share your sentences with the rest of the class by either sharing your screen or copying and pasting your sentences into the Zoom chat.
