## WR112 Criteria for Analysis of a Reading

- Read the assigned article critically and write your own analysis, interpretation, and conclusions responding to it.
- Begin with some objective facts, in particular a brief summary of the article.
- Take a strong position on the arguments presented in the article, either agreeing with the author, disagreeing, or partially agreeing and partially disagreeing with her.
- Explain why you take this position, illustrating your points with references to specific arguments in the article.
- *They Say/I Say* Chapter 4 provides templates for these three types of response. Examples include:
  - > Agreement: "Author X is surely right about \_\_\_\_\_, because..." (p. 60).
  - > Disagreement: "Author X is mistaken, because she overlooks..." (p. 58).
  - Simultaneously agreeing and disagreeing: "Although I agree with Author X up to a point, I cannot accept his overriding assumption that..." (p. 64).
- Remember to use present tense when summarizing and analyzing an author's works.
- They Say/I Say Chapter 8 explains how you can improve the cohesion of your writing by employing transitions to express the following ideas:
  - > Addition: furthermore, in addition, moreover, etc.
  - > Elaboration: in other words, that is, to put it succinctly, etc.
  - > Example: for instance, specifically, to take a case in point, etc.
  - > Cause and Effect: as a result, hence, therefore, etc.
  - > Comparison: likewise, similarly, etc.
  - > Contrast: although, however, in contrast, etc.
  - > Concession: admittedly, granted, to be sure, etc.
  - > Conclusion: as a result, in conclusion, to sum up, etc.
